## **New Education Programme**

As you may know, the National Curriculum is undergoing review. From 2022, Aotearoa New Zealand histories will be taught in all schools and kura. Some schools are already testing draft content this year.

To ensure our Education Programme is aligned with the National Curriculum, we have obtained funding support from The Sargood Bequest to develop new material.

## **Waka Festival and Weekend Workshops**

Early stage planning is underway for a Quiz Night and a series of weekend workshops focussing on Mirimiri and Rongoā Māori, Colonial Baking using the Museum's outdoor colonial oven, Printing and Blacksmithing.

We also are planning another larger event featuring Waka which will include learning about Waka traditions, construction and carving, paddling and sailing.
