'Stop the Leaks' update

Okains Bay Museum's leaky spouting is fixed, the Harris Cottage gets a facelift, and the Mana Taonga project gets a boost thanks to generous grants!


Due to the success of the 'Stop the Leaks' crowdfunding campaign, we've accomplished significant repairs and deferred maintenance, replacing all spouting, addressing courtyard flooding with a newly installed pump, and enhancing the weatherproofing of our buildings.

The momentum continues with support from the Parkinson Memorial Park Trust, which has granted funds for the restoration of the Harris Cottage. This building carries collections and stories of early Okains Bay families.

Additionally, the Stout Trust has generously contributed half the funds required for the Mana Taonga project. This initiative aims to enhance the taonga Māori collection through activities like information gathering, provenance research, cataloging, and condition reports. It will assist Te Rūnangao Koukourarata in exercising tāngata tiaki responsibilities and allow the Museum to make appropriate decisions, with information from whānau, hapū and iwi associated with the taonga Māori.

Support from the Rātā Foundation, Christchurch City Council's Strengthening Communities fund, the Te Papa Museum Hardship fund, and the Community Organisation Grants Scheme (COGS) has played a crucial role in sustaining our staff.

Waitangi Day Commemorations 2024 - Free Entry

After two years of COVID-19-enforced cancellations, the return of Waitangi Day Commemorations to Kawatea Okains Bay in 2024 is much anticipated, with visitors from as far away as the UK signaling their intention to attend.

The Museum is working in partnership with Te Rūnanga o Koukourarata to make the day as accessible and family-friendly as possible. Thanks to support from Manatū Taonga Ministry for Culture and Heritage and Christchurch City Council Events & Festivals, Waitangi Day Commemorations on Tuesday 6 February 2024 will be a free event for all.

The day's events will be focussed on the Museum grounds and the Ngāi Tahu Reserve opposite, where the pōwhiri, hāngī and waka landing will take place.

Even though it will be a free entry event, the Museum still needs to raise muchneeded funds. To do this, we will be running koha and ticketed 'side shows' throughout the day. Cafe food, ice creams and coffee will also be available on-site, and at the Bay's historic store nearby.

Families are invited to bring a picnic and spend the day commemorating the bicultural aspirations of the signatories of Te Tiriti, learning about the Ngāi Tahu Treaty story, and enjoying loads of family-friendly games, activities and displays.
